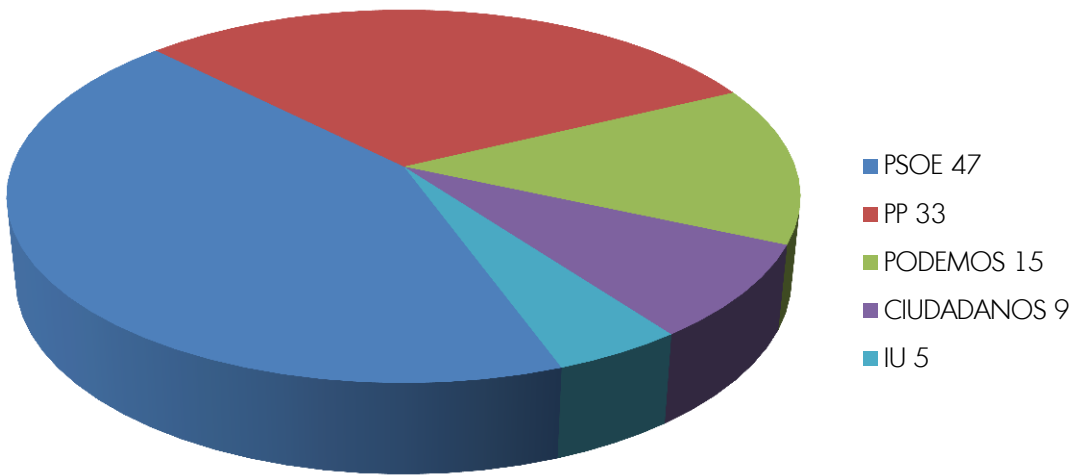

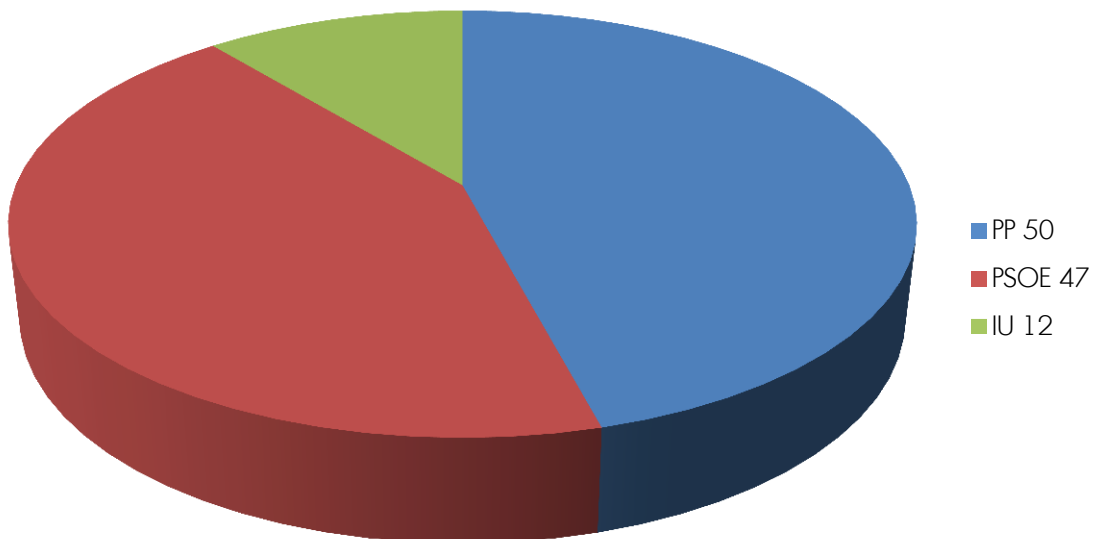
NUMBER OF SEATS IN THE PARLIAMENT OF ANDALUSIA: 109

MAIN FACTS OF THE ELECTIONS TO THE REGIONAL GOVERNMENT OF ANDALUSIA

Higher turnover: 132.775 more people

The Socialist PSOE has maintained the same number of seats (47) but it has lost 118.881 votes: its worst result ever

The Popular Party (PP) has lost 17 seats and 506.665 votes (a third of those it obtained in 2012)

Ciudadanos has obtained parliamentary representation for the first time, with 9 seats and 368.988 votes

Even if all of those who have now voted for Ciudadanos had voted for the PP before, there are still 137.677 former PP votes which have gone somewhere else

PODEMOS has entered the scene with 15 seats and 590.011 votes [twice as many as it obtained in Andalucía for the European elections (from 7,11% to 14,84%)]

Izquierda Unida (IU) has gone down from 12 seats to 5 and the number of votes has decreased from 438.372 to 273.927, losing 164.445 votes

PODEMOS could therefore have captured IU's votes, but there are still 425.566 unaccountable votes (new voters?)

The PP has only won in the province of Almería, and in the province of Seville it has lost over 100.000 votes

Cádiz, a former PP fiefdom (Teófila Martínez has been mayor of the city since 1995) has been won over by Podemos, which has emerged as the first party of the city. The PP has lost over 38% of its votes in Cádiz

Susana Díaz, PSOE candidate, has announced she will rule on her own, thus rejecting the possibility of forming a coalition government
